NATAS Northwest High School Awards for Excellence*

CALL FOR ENTRIES

What are the NATAS Northwest High School Awards for Excellence?

The NATAS Northwest High School Awards are intended to honor excellence in broadcast arts & sciences by high school students.

When is the entry deadline?

All entries must be received by 5:00 p.m. on March 10, 2010.

What kind of work can be entered?

Entries must be submitted as they were originally telecast, cablecast or webcast. There may not be any post-broadcast changes, except edits for time, as noted on the category descriptions that follow. An entry may be submitted by any student who is currently enrolled in high school. All students involved in the production must be high school students, and faculty involvement may be advisory only.

The entry must be sponsored by the student's school, afterschool program, community-based program, or public access facility where the work was produced.

There is no limit to the number of entries that may be submitted in each category. A production may be entered in more than one category.

Who receives the Award?

The NATAS Northwest High School Award for Excellence, an engraved glass pillar, will be presented to the sponsoring high school, after-school program, or producing organization. The students named on the entry will receive personalized certificates. The awards and certificates will be presented at the Northwest Regional Emmy Awards on June 5, 2010. Following the Emmy Awards, duplicate awards (glass pillars) with individual student names will be available at a cost of \$100.00.

What are the eligibility requirements?

All entries must have been originally broadcast, cablecast or webcast within the Northwest region (the states of Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Montana and Alaska) between March 2, 2009 and March 1, 2010. Applicants must be currently enrolled as fulltime high school students as of the application deadline.

What is the judging criteria?

Criteria will be similar to that applied to the judging of the Northwest Regional Emmy Awards. Entries will be judged on the basis of concept, content and execution which demonstrate awareness of broadcast journalism standards, including accuracy and fairness. Judges will particularly look for well-organized material, paying close attention to production values, selection of supporting visuals, clearly written on-camera and voice-over narration and appropriate use of interview content and sound.

CATEGORIES

News - For outstanding achievement in the reporting of news, information and current events. Entries may contain spot news coverage, investigations and feature stories on any newsworthy subject. Coverage of controversial issues is welcome. News entries may run no longer than (5) five minutes. In-studio set-up or anchor work will not be considered an asset unless it materially contributes to the editorial content of the individual report.

Cultural Affairs – For outstanding achievement in the reporting of content with cultural or artistic significance. Pieces may run no longer than (5) five minutes. Subject matter can include (but is not limited to) reports on popular trends, lifestyles, fashion, performing arts, music, fine arts, literature and historical retrospectives.

Sports – For outstanding achievement in the reporting of sports news and information. Pieces may run no longer than (5) five minutes. In-studio set-up or anchor work will not be considered an asset unless it materially contributes to the editorial content of the presentation.

Public Affairs – For outstanding achievement in a presentation of content with current social, civic, or other issue-oriented subject matter. Pieces may run no longer than (10) ten minutes.

Craft Achievement – For outstanding achievement in the technical aspects of an entry. Students who wish to enter a production demonstrating their on-camera performance, graphics presentation, animation, writing, camera work, special effects, editing, music arrangement or composition, scenic and production design, lighting, directing, audio or other production aspects are urged to submit in this category. Entries may run no longer than (10) ten minutes. An individual may enter a compilation of several examples of his or her specific craft achievement. Entry must specify what craft is being submitted for judging (i.e., writing, anchoring, animation, etc.)

Documentary – For outstanding achievement in the long-form treatment of a single non-fiction subject. Entries must run no longer than 30 minutes. If the original presentation ran more than 30 minutes, entrants are permitted to submit two 30-minute unedited segments that best exemplify the total work. Subject matter can include (but is not limited to) investigations, examinations of social issues, personal relationships, sports, lifestyles, music, performing arts, entertainment, and historical retrospectives.

Dramatic presentation – For outstanding achievement in presentation of a long-form treatment of a single subject. Entries must run no longer than 30 minutes. If the original presentation ran longer than 30 minutes, entrants are permitted to submit two 30-minute unedited segments that best exemplify the total work.

Public Service Announcement – For outstanding achievement in production of a public service announcement promoting a cause, organization or positive message. Spots may be no longer than :60 (sixty seconds).

BASIC REQUIREMENTS

Does all material have to be original?

At least two-thirds of an entry must consist of original material, unless previously produced material has been given some unique and creative treatment. Entrants must specifically identify and give credit to all non-original material included in the entry. This includes music use.

What if my entry is in a language other than English?

Entries in English will be judged by English-speaking peers. Entries in Spanish will be judged by Spanish-speaking peers. Entries in other languages may be entered, but the judging of these entries is subject to the availability of qualified judges who speak the language of the entry. We recommend that entrants in languages other than English or Spanish submit an English-language translation of the narration track.

How does the judging process work?

Entries will be judged by a panel of members of the National Academy of Television Arts & Sciences. Judges may not have a conflict of interest, which is described as having a direct involvement in the production of an entry, or having a personal relationship with a member of the production staff of an entry.

How do I enter my work?

Entries will be accepted only on DVD. The readability of the DVD is the responsibility of the entrant. DVDs that cannot be played will not be judged, and entry fees will not be refunded. It is highly recommended that DVDs be compatibility-tested on a different DVD player than the one used to burn the entry. Brand-name disks are recommended.

What does it cost to enter?

Each entry requires an accompanying processing fee of \$25.00, payable by check, VISA or MasterCard. Checks should be made out to “NATAS Northwest”. This fee is NON-REFUNDABLE.

The following guidelines shall apply:

- Submit entries on DVD-R format (DVD minus R).
- Use a clear sleeve or case.
- One entry per DVD.
- DVD must be labeled with the following information:
 - Name of entry.
 - Category number and name.
 - Running time.
 - Language of the entry, if other than English.
- For Craft Achievement category only: the craft to be judged.

Printed DVD labels (paper labels) are not suggested. They do not always stay adhered in the players. Instead use a permanent marker to legibly PRINT identifying information on the disk. Ink jet or laser printing that can be applied directly to the DVD face (printable media) is acceptable.

Complete the entry form and enclose with your entry and DVD.

LATE ENTRIES WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.

Entries, entry forms and checks/credit card payments must be postmarked no later than Monday, March 10, 2010.

Are there other rules?

Entries missing information on the entry form, or entries submitting incorrect fees, or entries that do not follow guidelines will be subject to disqualification.

The intentional falsification of production credits by an entrant will be the basis for disqualification of the entry.

All entries must be submitted as originally broadcast, cablecast or webcast. The Northwest Chapter of the National Academy of Television Arts & Sciences reserves the right to corroborate any information on an entry form, to combine duplicate entries, or to disqualify an entry. All entries are subject to approval by the Northwest Chapter.

Schools and student award recipients may refer to the fact that they are recipients of a “High School Award for Excellence presented by the Northwest Regional Emmy Awards,” but may not use the Emmy replica or the Emmy statuette in any form of advertising or promotion.
